

Excel Boat Club fills a niche on Lake Minnetonka.

BILL HEIAM CALLS HIMSELF A "HARDCORE WATER KIND guy." And he has the background to prove it — includi summers spent sailing, skiing and fishing on La Minnetonka, where his parents owned their home duri his childhood.

That's when he heard about the Excel Boat Club, where no members own a boat.

"I am surrounded by neighbors who have boats in their garages," says Heiam, who now lives in Chanhassen and owns a telecommunications sales agency. "I got sticker shock when I learned what it costs to rent a slip, and I heard horror stories about waiting two hours to launch at a landing."

These days, when Heiam and his family arrive at his club's pier in Excelsior, they are met by a valet who loads their gear into a cart and escorts them to one of the 18 boats they have selected for their day on the lake. Depending on their activities, the boat might be a 25-foot Glastron speedboat, a 24-foot Azure deck boat or a 26-foot Glastron with a cuddy cabin for naptime.

The valet backs the boat into the channel, then hops off at the main

pier — and away they go. At the end of the day, the valet hops back on, parks the boat in its slip and carries all the gear back to their car. Heiam has never cleaned a boat, gassed it, waxed it or even tied it up at the pier.

Susan Roberts, wife of Medtronic executive Dave Roberts, says they often use one of the club's big Bennington luxury pontoons for wine-tasting parties or cookouts (each pontoon has a large gas grill). Want it stocked with food and snacks? No problem. Need a driver to handle navigation? Just ask.

One nice thing about pontoon parties, Susan says, is playing host at the club and avoiding the bother of getting the house ready for guests. "It's one of the best things about summer," she says of her days on the lake.

"You won't find a higher-end service that's done in shorts and t-shirts," boasts Excel Boat Club owner Tom

His website (www.excelboatclub.com) makes the economic argument that owning and maintaining a boat is a lot more expensive than paying the club's annual membership fees, which range from \$3,195 to \$6,195.

"But for most of our members, it's not about the money," Jacob says. "They just don't want to deal with everything involved with owning a boat."

Excel members agree. "The average person who owns a boat uses it maybe 10 times a year," says Tim Fieldhouse, a Fortune 500 company executive from Shorewood. "For every hour spent boating, they probably spend three or four hours doing drudgery. I can't say that waxing a boat is my idea of a good time."
